Instructions for Authors – Proceedings of the Dene Languages

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1. Introduction

Papers from the Dene Languages Conference of 2010 will be published by the Alaska Native Language Center. Any paper presented at either of these conferences, or a new paper dealing with any aspect of Athabasc/kan linguistics or anthropology, is welcome. These are working papers and will receive only editorial reading.

2. Submission Guidelines

2.1 Deadline The deadline for submissions is March 1, 2011 . This will be our only deadline, and cannot be extended. If you think your paper will need some careful handling, please send it sooner; the sooner the better.

2.2 Submitting Your Paper

All submissions will be electronic. Please send your Word 972004 or .rtf file to Siri Tuttle at sgtuttle@alaska.edu as an attachment. Please include in your electronic submission, as attachments, any special font you are using, a .pdf of your paper, and a document containing your full name and affiliation, email/phone/fax, and earth address for correspondence.

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3. Style Guide

Basic style guidelines appear below. These instructions are formatted according to the guidelines and can be used as a model. If you have questions about fine points of style, write Siri at sgtuttle@alaska.edu or Olga Lovick at olga@lithophile.com.

3.1 Page Limit

The page limit is 20 pages, singlespaced and fully justified. The working papers will not be reduced, so there is no need to add extra space or make the font size large.

3.2 The First Page

- Title: bold and centered 14 pt. Times

skip a line

- Name: centered, 12 pt. Times
- Affiliation: Centered, 12 pt. Times

skip two lines Abstract: none

3.3 Formatting Specifications

- Font: 12 pt. Times for text and subheadings
- Margins: 1" left, right, top; 1.5" bottom, full justification
- Numbering: leave pages unnumbered (but please stay within the 20page limit)
- Subheadings should be flush left with 0.5" indent for subheading text
 - subheading 1 bold
 - subheading 2 italics
 - subheading 3 same as normal text
 - Please don't go below subheading 3!
- Use footnotes, not endnotes.
- References list: Use Chicago style, 0.25" hanging indent

- If you have graphics in the paper, make sure they are black and white (no millioncolor graphics!)
