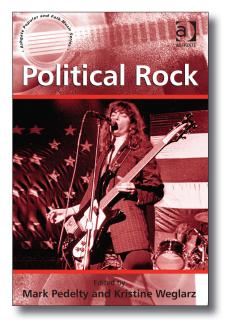

Kristine Weglarz is an Assistant Professor of Telecommunications and Film at the University of West Florida's Department of Communication Arts. Her dissertation and research focuses on the political economy of live rock performance, constructions of authenticity, protest rock, mediaphemes and "liveness" as cultural constructions. She teaches courses on multi-camera electronic video production, popular music and media studies, introduction to mass media and the political economy of media.

Mark Pedelty is an Associate Professor of Mass Communication at the University of Minnesota. He is the author of *War Stories: The Culture of Foreign Correspondents* (1995), *Musical Ritual in Mexico City: From the Aztec to NAFTA* (2004) and *Ecomusicology: Rock, Folk, and the Environment* (2012). Pedelty has also published a number of journal articles dealing with popular music, including 'Woody Guthrie and the Columbia River: Propaganda, Art, and Irony' in *Popular Music and Society* 31(3): 329–355 (2008). Dr. Pedelty is currently conducting applied research concerning music as environmental communication.

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
