#### **EHLS** at a Glance

- EHLS is a professional development program that prepares heritage language speakers who are naturalized citizens for career opportunities in the federal government.
- EHLS is an 8-month program: 6 months of intensive instruction followed by 2 months of part-time study.
- Each EHLS program participant receives a scholarship that includes full tuition and a monthly stipend.
- During the 6 months of intensive study, participants attend classes full time, and may not hold a job.
- EHLS goes beyond the training provided in academic business English programs.
   It prepares participants for professional positions that require research, analysis, and briefing in English and the heritage language.
- EHLS prepares participants to seek employment with the federal government through work on résumés and KSA statements and hands-on practice with the online application process.

### The Program

The English for Heritage Language Speakers (EHLS) program gives nonnative speakers the English language proficiency they need to succeed in government positions. EHLS also develops the professional skills and cultural awareness that promote success in the federal workplace.

#### **Key Topics and Activities**

- Professional oral communication, including presentation skills, meeting participation, and meeting facilitation
- · Professional writing, including analytical reporting, summarization, and evaluation
- · Technology use for communication, research, and presentation
- Federal job search preparation
- Open source research on a topic provided by a government agency

#### **Program Details**

- · Full scholarship and modest living stipend provided
- Three 8-week sessions of full-time study at Georgetown University in Washington, DC
- A final 8-week session of part-time classes which can be completed remotely

### **Participants**

Each year, the EHLS program recruits participants from different language backgrounds depending on national security priorities. In the past, EHLS participants have been native speakers of the following languages:

- Arabic
- · Persian Farsi
- Chinese
- Urdu
- Dari
- Pashto

To qualify for the EHLS program, an applicant must

- · Be a United States citizen
- · Have a Bachelor's degree
- · Have advanced professional proficiency in the heritage language
- Have high level proficiency in English
- · Be willing to commit to 8 months of study (6 months full time)
- Be willing to work for the federal government for at least one year

# **How to Apply**

The EHLS program takes place from January through August each year. The application is due in the preceding September. For application requirements and deadlines and an online application, visit www.cal.org/ehls

#### After the Program

Following graduation, scholarship awardees are required to work for the federal government for one year as employees of the Department of Defense, Department of State, Department of Homeland Security, or the Intelligence Community. Scholars must take the initiative to secure appropriate federal employment for themselves.
