With the publication of our 2019 book on Language and Neoliberal Governmentality (Routledge, Language, Society and Political Economy), we aimed to open a debate and advance scholarly theorizations of capitalism, power and changing conditions of language. The global pandemic has meant for many scholars like us forms of social and intellectual disconnection which have prevented us to fully engage in the debate we had started with this book.

With this seminar series jointly organized by the Center for Applied Linguistics at University College London and the MIRCo (Multilingualism, Discourse and Communication) at Universidad Autónoma de Madrid we intend to reopen this debate.

- How, in the language studies, do we address the question of capitalism and what does neoliberalism add to this debate?

 What is language in our work, and what changing visions of language are taking root in society, in connection with the transformations observed in the previous two points, and their effects?

- III. The very changing concept of language in society

For each event of this seminar series, we will put a basic text from our book for discussion on the table, which will be discussed by invited speakers with somewhat different intellectual positions.
