### 4. Three New SLA Positions Filled

Three positions, which grew out of members' suggestions over the last year, have been filled!

### Jennifer Delfino (jdelfino@illinois.edu) will serve as our Mentoring Coordinator.

Recall that this position aims to help junior scholars become more familiar with the SLA and offer mentoring opportunities for junior scholars and mid-career professionals at both academic institutions and related industries. Jennifer will work to expand the mentor-mentee network, which involves managing check-ins for mentors-mentees when necessary and pairing new mentors and mentees. Coordination work will also include maintaining and updating the database (i.e. spreadsheet) of current mentor-mentee pairings. The coordinator will also plan at least one in-person mentoring event and one virtual event annually. Finally, the coordinator will conduct an annual SLA mentorship survey. The mentoring coordinator will serve a two-year term. Please join me in thanking Jennifer.

#### Steven Black (<a href="mailto:sblack@gsu.edu">sblack@gsu.edu</a>) will serve as SLA's Accessibility Coordinator.

In this role, Steve will take the lead in planning, promoting, and—in collaboration with members of the extended SLA Board—implementing measures to increase access to all SLA events and publications (including but not limited to the journal, newsletter columns, and digital communications). Accessibility is broadly conceived to facilitate greater participation and opportunities at every level for historically marginalized groups, with particular emphasis on disability, region of residence, language backgrounds, and inequalities based on socioeconomic class, race, ethnicity, nationality, gender, and sexuality. In addition to working closely with the SLA executive board to increase and expand access, the SLA accessibility officer will liaise with the AAA Coordinator for Accessibility, Meetings and Conferences, and other AAA sections where appropriate. The Accessibility Coordinator will serve a two-year term. Many thanks to Steve for leading this important work.

#### Andy Graan and Rafadi Hakim are SLA's new Virtual Programming Coordinators.

Consistent with the SLA's interest in sharing and extending the reach of linguistic anthropological scholarship and doing so in accessible ways, the SLA encourages and supports virtual programming. This is particularly important to expand the reach for those who are not able to attend in-person events, such as the AAA conference and the SLA conference. Dear Colleagues,

We are thrilled to join the SLA as its **virtual program coordinators** and look forward to bringing meaningful and engaging online events and activities to the SLA community.

Just a few short words about ourselves:

Andy is a Core Fellow at the Helsinki Collegium for Advanced Studies at the University of Helsinki. His research in North Macedonia has focused on the politics of public spheres. Currently, he is writing about project making and the past, present, and future of the project form. Over the past few years, he has been active in the European Association of Social Anthropologists' Linguistic Anthropology Network, or ELAN, working with colleagues to foster community among linguistic anthropologists living, studying, working, and researching in Europe.

Fadi is a Postdoctoral Teaching Fellow at the University of Chicago. His ethnographic research in eastern Indonesia has focused on how gender, kinship, and religion emerge as relational categories through uses of language. He has coordinated interdisciplinary workshops and virtual data sessions to cultivate a sense of community among researchers in semiotics and linguistic anthropology at the University of Chicago.

Over the next academic year, we will be producing online content that responds to the broad interests and needs of the SLA's membership. Our planning is still in progress but, in general, we imagine this online forum as a space for: professionalization and mentoring workshops, writing workshops, workshops on methodology, and public discussions of social justice issues and contemporary political problems.
