# The Acquisition of Echoes as an Accommodation Strategy

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## What is an Echo?

- (1) A: I'm from Iceland.B: Oh, from Iceland. [SURPRISE]
- (2) A: It's a nice day, isn't it?
  B: Yeah, a nice day. [AGREE]
- (3) A: Go to the left.
  B: **To the left**, okay. [CONFIRM]

# Many Names?

- Echo [1, 2]
- Repetition [3, 4, 5]
- Reproduction [6]
- Mimicry [7]
- Imitation [8]

#### Echo — Accommodation

#### Echo's accommodative effects

- Enhancing solidarity [3]
- Ratifying listenership [5]
- Inducing prosociality [7]

## Echo — Typology

- Cultural difference
  - (4) Amonap (Brazil) [4, p. xiv]

    When I answered, "What are their names?" [the narrator] listed them

    [...] and had me repeat them until I seemed to know them well.

# Echo — Typology

- Linguistic difference
- (5) Warrongo (Australia) [9, p. 282]

A: banda-Ø yinda! emerge-IMP 2SG.NOM

'Come out!'

B:  $ngali-\emptyset$  banda- $\emptyset$ . 1DU-NOM emerge-IMP

'[OK,] we'll come out.'

# Echo — Acquisition

- Peak in 3yo? [1] Increase by age? [2]
- Helps learning syntax [8]

## Echo — Acquisition

- From "automatic" to "meaningful" [1]
- (6) Adult: O-namae-wa?
  polite-name-topic
  'What is your name?'
  - Child: Namae name

'name'

(7) Adult: Banana-yo, kore banana-particle this

'This is a banana'

Child: Banana? banana

'A banana?'

## Research Question

- How is (accommodative) echo acquired?
  - · What & when do children tend to echo?
  - · When do echoes become accommodative?
  - Cultural & linguistic differences?

## Methodology

- · ACQDIV Corpus [10]
  - · Child echoes more to caretakers?
  - Mother's attitude to more echoing child?
  - More echoes in some cultures?
  - Echo patterns change as children age?
  - · Child's personality & echo patterns?
  - · etc.
- Experiments
  - Do children echo to peers and other adults?
  - How do we perceive a more echoing child?

#### What We Can Know

- · How children learn to echo as accommodation
- How this learning varies individually, culturally, and linguistically
- · How we can help children learn it

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
