

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#### Internships at MDWg

Mirima Dawang Woorlab-gerring Language and Culture Centre (MDWg) is an Aboriginal organisation seeking to preserve and revitalise the Miriwoong language of the East Kimberley region of Western Australia. Our language revitalisation initiatives include a wide range of activities, such as an early childhood program, language classes, resource development, and bilingual radio programs, to name a few.

MDWg has been hosting linguist interns and volunteers from many different universities since 2010 and below is a selection of feedback received.

"My two-month internship at MDWg was a highlight of my doctoral studies (on cultural sustainability). It gave me first-hand insight into the rich complexities and challenges of language and cultural maintenance in the Australian context, and the wonderful opportunity to celebrate with the Miriwoong and MDWg community some of the successes of their remarkable efforts in this area. It was a privilege to learn a little of the language and culture too; and KJ, Rita, and the team couldn't have made me feel more welcome. The internship experience has led to further opportunities for me to work together with Australian Indigenous peoples, including a research project evaluation with the Yarrabah community (far north Qld) and a research and artistic collaboration with the TSI Murray Island (Mer) community in Australia. Even more importantly, it greatly enriched and deepened my understanding of what contemporary life is like for people living in a remote Indigenous community - I am most grateful for that."

"The internship has been an eye-opening experience in allowing me to see how linguistic theories can translate to real life. MDWg is such a successful example of a dedicated language centre and my time there was an invaluable experience for me as an indigenous linguist engaged in the revitalisation of my own community language. MDWg offers different types of internships, which differ in terms of length, engagement, and level of financial support.

1. Our **Standard Internship** program engages linguist volunteers for a period of 10 or more weeks to assist us with our various tasks related to language revitalisation. Successful candidates will get insight

into the typical operations of a language centre, including language documentation and revitalisation, literacy training, language teaching, resource development, radio broadcast production, training for Indigenous language workers, as well as technical and administrative tasks.

- 2. The **Special Internship** program aims at engaging linguist volunteers for a period of 6-12 months. While participants will naturally become familiar with all aspects of language revitalisation work, this program usually aims at a specific, time-limited project or focus area for the intern. Most typically, this will involve working with Indigenous language workers on training-related tasks in order to improve independent work and planning skills.
- 3. The **Language Nest Special Internship** program aims at engaging linguist volunteers for a period of 6-12 months. Their focus will be on the support of our team of Miriwoong women who are engaged in the Miriwoong early childhood language program. Typical tasks involve different forms of training, such as lesson planning, pedagogical skills, and resource development.

While MDWg is not in a position to pay any compensation, we have limited funds to subsidise the costs for accommodation. All interns are engaged as volunteers and their involvement does not constitute employment on any salary of wage. The weekly subsidy towards living expenses is made as a voluntary contribution. What we can offer is an unforgettable experience working with the local Miriwoong community, hands-on knowledge about the issues of language revitalisation and some skills related to the work of a field linguist.

All internships require a WA Working with Children Check and National Police Clearance. MDWg is prepared to cover the cost for these applications.

Applicants should have a background in languages, linguistics, education, Indigenous, or related fields, be open to working in a diverse cultural environment, and probably have some sense of adventure, including a tolerance to Kimberley temperatures. While Kununurra is located in one of the most beautiful areas of the country, please note that the region may experience extreme weather conditions, depending on the season. The nearest regional centre is Darwin in the Northern Territory (ca. 900 km).

Past experience has shown that internships at MDWg can be competitive, as we prefer to have only one intern at a time for each category. In order to apply, please send us an expression of brief interest first, indicating what type of internship you are interested in and we will respond with a detailed description.

Full applications should include a comprehensive CV and a cover letter which includes a preferred starting date - please follow the instructions on the detailed internship description.

#### Special Internship at Mirima Dawang Woorlab-gerring

Start date: around July/August 2019

We are currently looking for a linguist volunteer to join us for a longer period of time from mid-2019. The successful candidate would spend at least 6, ideally 12 months at MDWg to get deeper insight of our work and help us with a number of diverse tasks. One objective would be to further enhance existing skills in our Indigenous language workers and strengthen their capacity to work independently. The intern's role would include working with our staff to prepare Miriwoong language resources such as printed and digital resources, assist with the curriculum development for Miriwoong, support the preparation of school classes and help organise the production of radio programs. Another aspect of this role will be to develop a series of language videos for the Miriwoong language. All tasks will be in teamwork with our Miriwoong language workers and other interns as well as in collaboration with the senior linguist. There will also be the opportunity to engage in other activities such as language documentation and language revitalisation.

## Language Nest Special Internship at Mirima Dawang Woorlabgerring

Start date: Mid-July 2019

Our Miriwoong Language Nest (MDWg's children and schooling program) is looking for a volunteer to join us for a longer period of time from mid-2019. The successful candidate would spend at least 6, ideally 12 months at MDWg to support this program and assist with a number of diverse tasks. This will include assisting both the language nest facilitator and the indigenous teachers in preparing for daily lessons, activities, and anything else required to run language sessions. An interest in languages and how to both learn and teach them is crucial. You would also be involved in helping the Indigenous teachers acquire various other skills such as general computer proficiency, use of Microsoft Office, and use of language learning/documentation software. Additionally, you role would include helping Indigenous staff improve spoken and written Standard Australian English skills. A background in education and teaching will be an advantage.

Please submit an informal expression of interest first and we will send you further details about this opportunity. Full applications are due on 15 February 2019. A selection process will apply.

### Standard Internship at Mirima Dawang Woorlab-gerring

Start dates: February/March 2019; May 2019; July/August 2019; September/October 2019 (dates are negotiable but will be subject to avoiding overlap with other interns)

The Standard Internship is an all-round experience of MDWg's work and will usually go over 10-12 weeks. The successful candidate will be involved in the various language revitalisation activities at MDWg, which includes day-to-day support of Miriwoong language workers. Regular activities include the weekly Miriwoong Knowledge Cycle, lesson planning, bilingual radio broadcasts, technical tasks such as audio/video recording and editing, resource development, fieldtrip organisation, and other language learning activities - usually based on the intern's individual skills and interests.

Where a Special Intern is also present at the time, the Standard Intern will work closely together with her/him.

### **Shorter stays**

Sometimes we are asked about the possibility of shorter stays. We try to avoid such short stints as our team meets many new people throughout the year and establishing meaningful relationships naturally takes a bit of time. We therefore encourage potential applicants to consider a longer-term commitment along the lines of the internships described above.
